A RESPECTFUL ENVIRONMENT

At Mooroolbark College, the Pastoral Care structure is centered around the student, with their most immediate pastoral needs being met and nurtured by their Home Group Coordinator and Home Group Teachers but it doesn't stop there.

Research indicates that cognitive development cannot take place separately from the influences of self-esteem and inter-personal relationships. We take the responsibility of teaching our students to be responsible citizens very seriously. We set clear behavioural expectations of our students and support them to uphold the standards of Mooroolbark College, where orderly teaching and learning promotes outstanding outcomes.

At Mooroolbark College, we consider it is the responsibility of **all** teachers to get to know students in the broadest sense and to establish a respectful classroom atmosphere that encourages growth, self-discipline and the acceptance of personal accountability. It is actually the classroom teachers who set the tone of the school by ensuring pastoral care is regarded a normal part of every teacher's daily interaction with students. Consequently, students at Mooroolbark College feel secure in the strong and respectful relationships between staff and students.

TRANSITION FROM PRIMARY TO SECONDARY SCHOOL

Our aim is to ensure every Year 7 student feels happy, secure and confident to provide a solid start to their secondary education.

Our Transition Program begins in primary school and is supported by the Transition Coordinator all the way through Term 1 of Year 7. Supported by a Year 10 Peer Support Leader, our Year 7 students are mentored and involved in many friendship-building activities as they are immersed into the day to day life of the College.

QUALITY ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

Mooroolbark College is committed to fostering the talents of all students so that individual potential is maximised. The College provides a wide range of programs and academic support services designed to ensure a high level of interest and enthusiasm for students around learning.

The College is a Year 7-12 school that reflects and responds to current research regarding how young people develop and learn. Students have a structured and sequential learning program exposing them to a wide variety of subjects that provide them with a solid foundation in literacy and numeracy, while digital technology is fully integrated into the learning program.

Creative and innovative use of technology throughout the College ensures fabulous opportunities for 'anytime - anywhere learning' for students. Our Technology program covers food, textiles and various materials including wood and metal and provides a balance to our students' academic education.

Academic rigour, initiative and self-discipline constitute the central philosophy as students progress through Years 10, 11 & 12. The majority of our students undertake the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE). Access to acceleration and enrichment opportunities are optimised through a vertical structure in Years 10, 11 and 12. The Pathways Team at Mooroolbark College supports students to develop goals and career pathways. The College enjoys excellent relationships with a number of tertiary education providers and students are presented with a range of tertiary and workplace options and opportunities.

DYNAMIC LANGUAGE PROGRAM

At Mooroolbark College we have a dynamic and engaging language program for students from Years 7 to 12. At Year 7 students are offered the choice of two languages; German or Mandarin. Students are immersed in both language and cultural studies. With each language choice, comes the opportunity for students to develop their cultural understanding through either a German heritage tour or an international tour to China as part of our sister school exchange program.

ASPIRE - CREATIVE THINKERS

WHAT IS ASPIRE?

Mooroolbark College has provided excellence to the local community and surrounding district for 40 years. We know from experience that all students' learning needs are different and as such we provide a diverse range of programs to cater for our students. Our VCE results are consistently high, a testament to the culture of excellence we engender at Mooroolbark College.

Mooroolbark College ensures that we continue to meet our students' growing needs through a broad program including the ASPIRE program. This program targets students with high aspirations who actively set and strive to meet challenging learning goals. ASPIRE students consistently aim for their personal best.

These students learn through engaging in a stimulating curriculum, which is designed to respond to their abilities, interests and needs.

HOW DOES THE ASPIRE PROGRAM WORK?

The ASPIRE program encompasses Mathematics, Science, English and Humanities. ASPIRE students are students that are looking to maximise their learning at school through increased effort and dedication.

ASPIRE is not an acceleration program. It is a program targeted to harness the efforts and abilities of hard working students in order for them to develop transformative problem solving skills that can be applied to all aspects of their schooling.

ASPIRE students will engage in tasks which require higher level, complex thinking and they will be encouraged to participate in a range of intellectual pursuits including: additional educational excursions, externally organised competitions with an emphasis on team work and collaborative learning.

Selection into the ASPIRE classes is by examination, with student acceptance into the program being dependent on the result. Places in the class are limited to 25 students. Upon reaching Year 10, ASPIRE students will be expected to take on an accelerated VCE subject.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP

Students at Mooroolbark College are actively involved in leadership training and development from Years 7 to 12. Leadership provides students with increased confidence, self-esteem and understanding of the significant role of the leader.

There are many opportunities for students to take on leadership. The College boasts an active Student Representative Council, College Captains, Senior House Captains, Middle School House Captains, Environmental Committee, Social Committee Captains, Peer Mediators and Peer Support Leaders.

STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL

At Mooroolbark College we have a long standing tradition of providing a meaningful 'student voice' for our student body. One of the many ways we do this is through our Student Representative Council (SRC). This provides students with the opportunity to make a real and lasting difference to the learning experience of all students at the College. Each House is represented at each year level to form the general SRC Committee. The SRC executive meets regularly with the College Principal and the SRC President represents the College student body on School Council. The SRC is a student elected body and the SRC President reports back to the student at each General Assembly. Being part of the SRC provides opportunities to develop leadership, communication and interpersonal skills. SRC members are involved in leadership training, VIC SRC and also take part in model United Nations and parliamentary opportunities. SRC representatives work closely with an SRC Liaison staff member to guide and mentor them, to ensure they are an effective student body within the school.

DUKE OF EDINBURGH AND ADVANCE SPORTS LEADERSHIP - DEVELOPING COMMUNITY MINDED STUDENTS

At Year 9, students participate in either the Duke of Edinburgh or the Advance Sports Leadership.

The Duke of Edinburgh Certificate requires students to complete four sections: providing service to others, participating in physical recreation, learning a new skill or further developing a new skill and undertaking an adventurous journey. The Duke Edinburgh Award is an internationally recognised and global service based program which builds the skills to equip Mooroolbark College students for life and work, by creating opportunities to get physically active, give service and experience adventure.

The Advance Sports Leadership Certificate has three areas of learning: developing community links, enhancing communication skills and project management skills. With a focus on sports leadership, this program involves working within local primary schools and other community groups to assist in the running of sports and recreation programs. Advance gives Mooroolbark College students a chance to do something great in their community. Students are able to plan projects, meet new people, build skills and make a difference in their community.

CLUB 3 - 4

At Mooroolbark College we provide opportunities for students to learn in a variety of situations, both in and out of the classroom. Each Tuesday and Thursday afternoon we support student learning in a supportive and encouraging environment at Club 3 - 4. Twice a week we offer homework clubs for both junior and senior students. Staffed by our teachers, it is an opportunity for students to work individually or work in study groups. In addition, our Year 9 and 10 students support our Year 7 and 8 students by providing peer tutoring through the Supportive Friends Program.

GOING HIGH TECH

Whether you like coding, robotics or electronics, Mooroolbark College provides multiple opportunities to develop skills and interests in STEAM (Science, Technology, Arts and Mathematics). Providing opportunities for students to experiment and learn using a range of technologies is essential as we move further into the 21st Century. Coding skills to create life-like models, using 3D printing technology or manipulating robots, are everyday parts of the Mooroolbark College curriculum. Mooroolbark College is proud to be partnership member of the state of the art Yarra Ranges Discovery Centre, which provides all Mooroolbark College student the opportunity to work with all advanced technology in a problem solving and creative environments.

HOME GROUP AND HOUSE STRUCTURE




On arrival at Mooroolbark College, students are assigned to one of our four Houses and then placed into a corresponding Home Group, new students are placed with their siblings (if applicable).

Home Groups consist of approximately 30 students from Years 7 to 12 which results in students forming meaningful relationships across all year levels. The Home Group provides students with the same Coordinator during their time at the College. They meet daily, creating a valuable opportunity for pastoral care activities, social interaction as well as the practical duty of distributing important school information. The Home Group Coordinator comes to know their student group very well, they provide advice, support and consistency throughout the students life at the College.

The House System is an essential feature of College life with Houses competing in Sport, Drama, Performing Arts and many other co-curricular activities throughout the year.

Recent surveys of our students indicate they are 'happy' at school and feel 'connected' to their educational environment. This connectivity can be attributed to the success of our Home Group and House Structure as the lives of our students are greatly enriched by strong relationships across the entire student body. This happiness directly correlates to our academic success.





THE MOOROOOLBARK COLLEGE HOUSE CUP

Mooroolbark College encourages students to participate actively in all aspects of College life. Therefore, our House Cup promotes active involvement in academic, sporting, musical and dramatic pursuits as well as recognising acts of social justice.




PERFORMING AND VISUAL ARTS
